Dear Chairman Inouye and Chairwoman Feinstein, and Ranking Members Cochran and Alexander:

We are writing on behalf of the undersigned organizations to urge you to support funding of \$475 million in the FY 2010 EPA budget for the multi-agency Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) as you prepare to resolve differences with your colleagues in the House of Representatives. The House has provided the President's full request of \$475 million in the appropriations bill for the Department of Interior, Environment and Related Agencies and we ask that you accept this funding level.

The GLRI builds on priorities and recommendations established in 2005 in the Great Lakes Regional Collaboration Strategy to Restore and Protect the Great Lakes, a comprehensive plan that defines the problems facing the lakes, outlines solutions and provides clear goals for measuring progress. Our agencies and organizations – representing the Great Lakes states, tribes, business and industry, environmental and conservation organizations – helped develop the 2005 strategy and have consistently called for federal leadership to implement it. **We stand united in our strong support for the GLRI and view its full funding as a significant regional priority.**


The Great Lakes region is well organized and prepared to target the full \$475 million to the most urgent problems facing the Great Lakes. The Great Lakes states have identified high-priority, on-the-ground restoration actions that are ready to be implemented immediately. They are prepared to coordinate actively with local governments, conservation organizations and other partners to administer the new funding swiftly and efficiently. have identified a significant unmet need for restoration actions that clearly justifies the appropriation of the full \$475 million for the GLRI.


